# Highlights from National Convention in Chicago

The 44th National Council of Jewish Women's triennial convention took place in Chicago, March 9-12. More than 400 women from all over the country participated in work-

shops, forums, program fairs and NCJW official business. Representing NCJW-GNO's section were President Ina Davis, Michal Fishman, Barbara Herman, Sue Jernigan, Joel Myers and Dana Shephard.

Two major items on the convention agenda included

- 1) Plan A NCJW's national campaign to promote and advocate for comprehensive sex education in schools and access to contraception, and
- 2) Promote the Vote, Protect the Vote NCJW's national get-out-the-vote campaign for the 2008 presidential election.

The conference featured nationally-renowned speakers, Cecile Richards, president of Planned Parenthood and daughter of the late Ann Richards, former governor of Texas, who spoke

about access to contraception; and Linda Wertheimer, National Public Radio's congressional correspondent, who enlightened the crowd with her insider's

knowledge of the political landscape. To learn more about these campaigns, go to www.ncjw.org. During the convention NCJW participants attended workshops to help them hone their skills on topics such as fundraising, building coalitions and raising NCJW's visibility in one's community. A major

portion of the convention was dedicated to reviewing NCJW's by-laws, mission and principles. There was robust discussion around motions made to change or add language that bet-

ter reflects NCJW's mission and beliefs concerning women's civil rights: reproductive choice, religious freedom, violence against women, safety nets for children, and contraceptive access.

NCJW-GNO's Barbara Herman and Dana Shepard each played a leadership role in national committees that reviewed the principles and by-laws, respectively. A highlight of the convention was the awarding of the 2008 Outstanding Pioneer Award to Joel Myers, NCJW-GNO's Vice President for Public

Affairs. The convention ended with the inauguration and celebration of NCJW's new president Nancy Ratzan who spoke passionately about her plans for the future of NCJW.

#### **New Orleans "Newbie" National Convention Notes**

I was flattered and delighted when Ina asked me if I could attend the National Convention in Chicago. As a new member, I am still feeling my way around our organization. From my local perspective, NCJW was a group of women who had spent a century quietly providing volunteer services and philanthropic support for some important and specific local programs. When I joined the year after Katrina, the uncertainty of what portion of our member ship had returned was still a big question. Programs which are a big part of our activities, such as HIPPY, were on hold for a myriad of reasons, none of which we could control. Other programs in which we participated simply did not "come back".

The more I listened, the more impressed I became. Our Section had been a catalyst for numerous programs. The connection between members was strong, and Ina's new leadership was supported by a Board that had experience, energy and commitment. I was excited to participate, but I still did not get the Big Picture.

The National Convention in Chicago provided me with the frame of reference for our members, our Section, and our entire organization. As I watched the discussions about our mission, and listened to impassioned speeches regarding resolutions and by-laws, I realized that NCJW, nationally, and through each section, is composed of people who care to make a difference. The drive to ensure that our own projects embody our national mission, which had seemed almost academic when sitting in a room of women that I barely knew, suddenly made sense. It was as if I had just found the map.

The Chicago Convention gave me the opportunity to view the whole organism and see the resources provided by our National organization. Meeting women from around the country and exchanging ideas and challenges gave me my first real moments of NCJW pride. And that pride, which lingers and now shapes my NCJW experience, is derived from my excitement and growing understanding of OUR Section.

As you longtime members know, NCJW is not an activity. It is a wonderful part of the journey in lives seeking solutions to social and systemic problems, which may be achieved through our strength and our vision. Thank you for inviting me.

## Legislative Day in Baton Rouge

This year we decided to do something different for Legislative Day; we went to Baton Rouge to advocate for women's health!

This effort is in keeping with National's Plan A adopted as one of its major efforts this year.

This plan, which is a campaign for Contraceptive Access, educates and empowers individuals to advocate for women's universal access to contraceptive information and health services.

We were very fortunate to have Jenny Nathan, who has been NCJW's Grassroots Administrator since February of 2007, come to visit us. In her capacity, she works with sections and members across the country to engage in projects related to Plan A.

The night before we went to Baton Rouge, Ina had an open board meeting dinner at her house. Jenny spoke about Plan A as well as our efforts the next day. The meeting was very well attended, interesting and fun.

Jenny also went with us to Baton Rouge.

This year we joined Planned Parenthood who is sponsoring 2 bills, one of which is HB 562 by Representative Karen Carter Peterson. This would require insurers who provide an otherwise full range of prescription drug coverage to include all FDA approved contraceptives. This bill was going to be heard in the Insurance Committee the day we were there. Jenny helped us write a statement so that we could testify.

Unfortunately, the bill was not heard that day; however, we were fascinated with those that were discussed, among them more coverage for children with autism. Women got up and told their stories which were unbelievably sad; the young woman next to me never stopped crying.

After the hearings we went to
